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# Information For Patients

This booklet provides information to help you decide whether to undergo dental implant treatment. It explains how the procedure is performed, the potential benefits and risks, and what to expect before, during and after care.

You may wish to discuss this information with a partner, family member or carer before making your decision. You will be asked to sign consent forms prior to treatment, so it is important that you understand the contents of this booklet before proceeding.

If you have any questions, it may be helpful to write them down so that you can discuss them with your dentist or a member of the clinical team.

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## What are Dental Implants?

Dental implants are artificial tooth roots, usually made of biocompatible materials such as titanium, that are placed into the jawbone to support replacement teeth.

Once the implant integrates with the bone, it can support a crown, bridge or denture to restore function and appearance. Implants may be used to replace a single tooth, multiple teeth or to support full-arch restorations.

Treatment plans are tailored to individual needs based on oral health, bone condition and treatment goals.

## Why Consider This Procedure?

You may consider dental implants if you experience:

- Missing teeth
- Difficulty chewing
- Instability with removable dentures
- Bone loss in the jaw
- Desire for a fixed tooth replacement
- Functional or aesthetic concerns related to missing teeth

Suitability depends on bone quality, gum health, general health and lifestyle factors.

## Preparing for Treatment

Before treatment you may be advised to:

- Undergo dental examination and imaging studies
- Disclose all medical conditions, medications and allergies
- Complete preliminary treatments such as hygiene therapy
- Stop smoking if advised
- Maintain good oral hygiene
- Follow instructions regarding eating or drinking if sedation is planned

Your dentist will develop a personalised treatment plan based on clinical findings.

# Your Treatment Journey (International Patients)

## Initial Assessment

Your medical history, dental records, photographs and imaging are reviewed.

## Travel Arrangements

Airport pickup and accommodation may be arranged through the treating clinic.

## Pre-Treatment Appointment

You will attend a consultation for examination, confirmation of the treatment plan and consent.

## Treatment Phase

Procedures are performed in a dental clinic or hospital environment.

## Follow-Up

Additional visits may be required for healing, adjustments or placement of final restorations.

## Return Travel

Patients are usually advised to remain abroad for a short period to allow for early follow-up before travelling home.

## The Procedure

Dental implant treatment is typically performed under local anaesthesia, with sedation or general anaesthesia in selected cases.

During surgery, the implant is placed into the jawbone through a small incision in the gum. The area is then closed to allow healing. Over time, the implant integrates with the surrounding bone.

After sufficient healing, a connector component (abutment) and the final restoration are attached.

Surgery time varies depending on the number of implants placed and the complexity of the case.

## After the Procedure

After implant placement you may experience:

- Mild to moderate discomfort
- Swelling of the gums or face
- Minor bleeding
- Bruising
- Temporary difficulty chewing

These effects are generally temporary and improve as healing progresses.

## Recovery and Expected Results

### Early Healing

Soft tissue healing occurs over days to weeks.

### Osseointegration

The implant gradually integrates with the bone over several months.

### Final Restoration

Once healing is complete, the final crown, bridge or denture is placed. Long-term success depends on oral hygiene and regular dental care.



## Aftercare Instructions

You may be advised to:

- Maintain excellent oral hygiene
- Use prescribed medications or mouthwash
- Avoid hard foods during early healing
- Avoid smoking
- Attend scheduled follow-up appointments

Following aftercare instructions supports proper healing.

## Potential Benefits

Dental implants may:

- Restore chewing function
- Improve speech
- Provide stable tooth replacement
- Preserve jawbone structure
- Enhance comfort compared to removable dentures
- Improve appearance and confidence

Results vary between individuals.

## Risks and Complications

All surgical procedures carry some degree of risk.

Possible complications may include:

- Infection
- Bleeding
- Implant failure or lack of integration
- Damage to surrounding teeth or structures
- Nerve injury causing altered sensation
- Sinus complications in upper jaw procedures
- Need for additional treatment

Your dentist will discuss risks specific to your case.



## Procedure-Specific Considerations

### **Bone Quantity and Quality**

Adequate bone is required for implant stability. Bone grafting may be necessary in some cases.

### **Healing Time**

Treatment may involve several stages over months.

### **Maintenance**

Implants require ongoing care similar to natural teeth.

### **Medical Factors**

Conditions such as uncontrolled diabetes or smoking may affect healing.

## When to Seek Medical Advice

Seek dental or medical attention if you experience:

- Increasing pain or swelling
- Fever
- Persistent bleeding
- Signs of infection
- Implant mobility
- Difficulty swallowing or breathing

## Questions to Ask Your Surgeon

You may wish to ask:

- Am I a suitable candidate for dental implants?
- How many implants will I need?
- How long will treatment take?
- What results are realistic?
- What maintenance will be required?
- What costs are involved?



## Further Information and Consent

Before proceeding with surgery you will be asked to sign a consent form confirming that:

- You understand the nature of the procedure
- The potential risks and benefits have been explained
- You have had the opportunity to ask questions
- You understand that results may vary between individuals

The final decision regarding suitability for surgery is made by the treating surgeon following medical assessment.
